## Individual Narrative of Mary<sup>5</sup> Way [46] Daughter of John Way and Martha<sup>4</sup> Leverich [12] Wife of James Killmaster

Mary Way was born at an unknown date, probably at Newtown, Queens, New York. She was a daughter of John Way and Martha Leverich, according to Glenn Way's *Descendants of James Way of Newtown, N.Y.* No source has been found to confirm this.<sup>1</sup> She married James Killmaster of New York on 7 Mar 1757 at Newtown, Queens, New York, at the Newtown Presbyterian Church.<sup>2,3</sup>

Several records exist of a James Killmaster in Manhattan, New York County, New York in this time period. However, there is no direct evidence connecting him with the James Killmaster who married Mary Way.

On 9 August 1739 a James Killmaster, Feltmonger, was named a "freeman."<sup>4,5</sup> On 21 September 1752, Mary Killmaster, widow of New York, "skinner", made a will which named among others her grandchildren, including James Killmaster, Thomas Killmaster, Anne Killmaster, and Elizabeth,wife of Nathaniel Slone of New York, mariner. The will also mentions property purchased in 1745 of John and Elizabeth Killmaster, without specifying a relationship.<sup>6</sup> A James Killmaster was among the signers on 16 October 1776 of a memorial to Admiral Lord Richard Howe and General Sir William Howe, expressing loyalty to King George the Third. This may or may not have meant James was a loyalist. It is suggested that many Whigs signed out of fear of the consequences of not signing, since New York was then occupied by British forces.<sup>7</sup> No "James Killmaster" is found in the 1790 Census. This census does record an Elizabeth Killmaster and a Nathaniel Killmaster in the Montgomery Ward, New York County.<sup>8</sup>

Neither a specific date of death nor a place of burial has been identified for Mary Way Killmaster or her husband James Killmaster.
