

**Individual Narrative of Jane⁸ Townsend Leverich [242]
Daughter of John⁷ Leverich [125] and Alletta Berrian
Wife of Russell Hinckley**

Jane Townsend Leverich was born on 26 September 1817 at Newtown, Queens Co, New York, the daughter of John Leverich and Aletta Berrian. Jane was baptized 28 July 1822 at the Newtown Presbyterian Church, in addition to her brothers Richard Titus Leverich and John Goldsmith Leverich.^{1,2}

On 16 November 1838 Jane T. Leverich wrote from Newtown, Queens Co, New York to her brother Richard T. Leverich in Danville, Vermilion Co, Illinois. She recounted the activities of family and friends including their brother John. Also included were Uncle Ezra, Aunt Betsey, Aunt Catherine, Peter Rapelye and his sisters and Henry Riker. She further reports that Miss Maria Wetmore is married to a Capt. Hoyt of New York; that Doctor Woodhull has been dead about three weeks; Miss Margaret Rapelye was to be married to the Rev. Mr. Garretson; and Aunt C. will be married to Mr. Samuels. Others of note included Jane Bonnett, Sally and Ann Palmer.^{3,4}

Jane T. Leverich married Russell Hinckley of Belleville, St. Clare Co, Illinois on 6 January 1846 at Newtown, Queens Co, New York, The ceremony was performed by the Rev. John Goldsmith, pastor of the Newtown Presbyterian Church. The Rev. Goldsmith was the namesake to Jane's brother John Goldsmith Leverich.^{5,6}

Russell Hinckley was born 19 February 1821 the son of Timothy Hinckley (1798-1855) and Hannah Smith (1797-1861) of Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois.^{7,8,9}

Hinckley's Mill, located on the southeast corner of West Lincoln and South First Streets in Belleville was built by Richard Rapier in 1832 and disposed of by him in 1837. In 1847 Russell Hinckley bought it and operated it continually thereafter until 1890.¹⁰

Jane T. Hinckley, age 29, was recorded in the 1850 U.S. Census of Belleville, St. Clair County, Illinois. Her husband Russell Hinckley, merchant age 29, was the head of household and the household included their daughters Mary E. Hinckley, age 3, and Alletta Hinckley, age 1.¹¹

Prior to 1852, Belleville's banking history was vague, and little of a definite nature had been recorded. But in that year, Russell Hinckley established his private banking institution, and until its failure it was the leading bank in the community. It was located in a building erected in about 1839 for the Illinois State Bank, and was razed in 1896 to make way for a newer bank structure.¹²

Russell Hinckley purchased multiple tracts of public land, about 31, mostly in the year 1854. The earliest purchase took place on 1 July 1853 and consisted of 80 acres in Section 1, Township 4 North, Range 3 East.¹³

Jane T. Hinckley, age 40, was recorded in the 1860 U.S. Census of Township 1, Range 8 in St. Clair County, part of Belleville, Illinois. Her husband Russell Hinckley, age 39 banker and miller, was the head of household with real estate valued at \$30,000 and personal estate valued at \$20,000. The household also included their children Mary E. age 13; Russel L. age 5; Jane W. age 4; and Walter age seven months.¹⁴

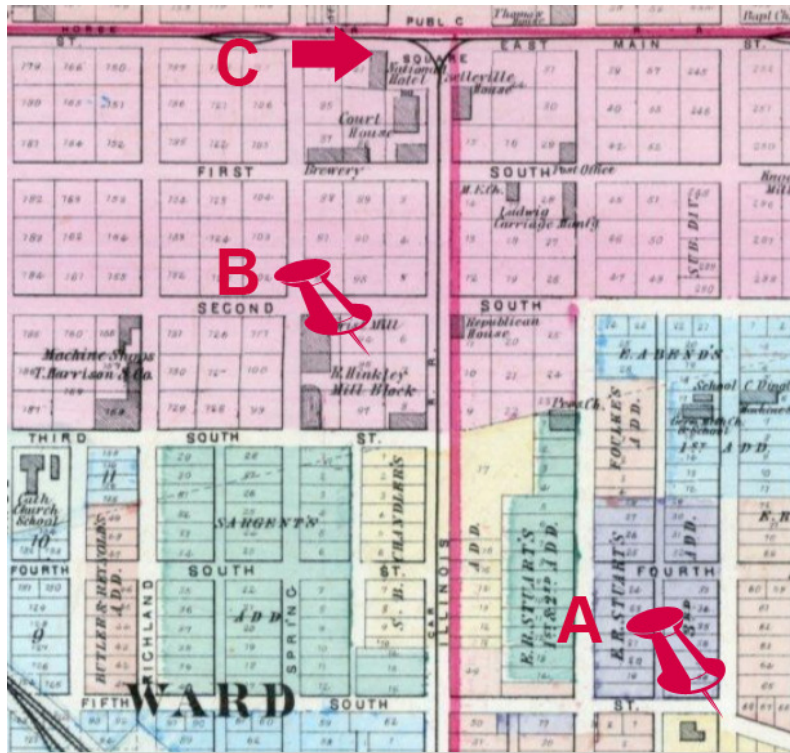
Russell Hinckley was recorded in the 1860 City Directory of Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois: banker, office N.W. corner Illinois and Public Square; residence north side 2nd Street south, between Illinois and Spring.¹⁵

Russell Hinckley was recorded in the 1868-1869 City Directory of Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois: banker, n s Public Square; residence South 2nd Street between Spring and Illinois.¹⁶

Jane T. Hinckley, age 50, was recorded in the 1870 U.S. Census of Belleville, St. Clair County, Illinois. Her husband Russell Hinckley, age 50 banker, was the head of household with real estate valued at \$120,500 and personal estate valued at \$122,000. The household also included their children Russell age 17; Jane age 14; and Walter age 10.¹⁷

In 1874 the *East St. Louis Press* brought out Russell Hinckley of Belleville (Illinois) as a candidate for congress. Mr. Hinckley was identified as a perfect gentleman, a staunch republican, and a man of wealth; in fact it was speculated that he possessed so many good qualities it was doubted he could be elected if nominated.¹⁸

Russell Hinckley was recorded in the 1877 City Directory of Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois: banker and miller Public Square; residence south west corner 5th Street South and Jackson Street.¹⁹

Jane T. Hinckley, age 62, was recorded in the 1880 U.S. Census of Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois. Her husband Russell Hinckley, age 59 banker and miller, was the head of household. The household also included their children Jane W. age 23 and Walter R. age 20; and a niece C. Rath, age 4.²⁰

Russell Hinckley is listed in the 1884 City Directory of Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois. Russell is identified as banker, north west corner Public Square and Illinois Street; residence south west corner of 5th Street South and Jackson Street. The city directory also lists Hinckley Mills, Russell Hinckley proprietor, south west corner 2nd Street South and Spring Street between Illinois Street and Spring Street.²¹

On 2 October 1885 the *Chicago Tribune* reported that "the all-absorbing topic today was the failure of Russell Hinckley. At an early hour in the morning a large crowd gathered in front of the bank on the east side of the square. Most of the people were depositors, and many pathetic incidents occurred. It is said that if 75 cents on the dollar were realized then the depositors were lucky. In the assets Mr. Hinckley scheduled his mill at \$80,000. All competent judges say that it will not bring \$30,000 today. The same rule applied to other assets, especially the real estate."²²

On 8 October 1885 the *Decatur (IL) Weekly Republican* reported that the failure of Russell Hinckley the banker and miller of Belleville had created the most intense excitement in that city and vicinity. The list of depositors included many poor people, who could not afford to lose the amounts of their deposits. Mr. Hinckley had long been looked upon as one of the most honorable and upright business men in Belleville, and his failure had caused such a shock in the city as it had never before experienced.²³

On 22 September 1888 the *St. Louis Republic* reported that "Russell Hinckley, the well-known Belleville banker, failed about three years ago. The bank had been established for many years and was considered as one of the safest in the city of Belleville. The bank had a large patronage, especially among the farmers of St. Clair County. Russell Hinckley was the sole owner and held a large interest in real estate and farming lands. At the time of the failure a large amount in deposits was held by the bank. Several efforts toward a settlement were made, but utterly failed until Attorney W. N. Horner took hold of the case and brought about a settlement with the creditors at 50 cents on the dollar. Mr. Horner made arrangements with several capitalists, who advanced the money, giving a mortgage on the Hinckley property for \$64,428, which was held by Mr. Joseph Ogle, Ben Higgins, Ben Smith, and Henry M. Needles, who was appointed administrator. A few days ago the mortgage was foreclosed, and yesterday the property in Belleville was sold at master's sale. The Hinckley Bank on the corner of the public square and Illinois Street sold for \$5,500. The Hinckley Mill with warehouses and other appurtenances brought \$15,000. The well-known Hinckley House realized \$7,000, and two lots on South Second Street went for \$6,000." "The Hinckley homestead on South Street was sold the next day by the Master-in-Chancery Underwood for the benefit of Hinckley's creditors for \$12,000."^{24,25}

Mrs. Russell Hinckley Sr. died 10 December 1888 in the 72nd year of her age, after an illness of about one week, which was caused by a stroke of paralysis with which she was sickened. Mrs. Hinckley had resided in Belleville over 40 years and left a husband and four married children to mourn her loss. She was formerly Miss Jane T. Leverich and was born on Long Island, New York. She was related to the Wiggins families of St. Louis. Jane was buried at the Walnut Hill Cemetery in Belleville, 2nd addition, Lot 13, Grave 4.^{26,27}

Jane T. Hinckley made a last will and testament dated 29 November 1888, which was proved in St. Clair County, Illinois 11 December 1888. The will does not name her husband Russell Hinckley. Jane directs that any money she shall leave at the time of death be equally divided between her dear children, whom she identifies as: Mary Eugenia Davis; Russell Leverich Hinckley; Jennie W. Menkens; and Walter Raleigh Hinckley. In addition Jane names her "adopted daughter" Ruth Jenkins Hinckley in remembrance of her loving kindness to her poor sick Mama.²⁸

Sometime following the failure of the Hinckley Bank in 1885, Russell Hinckley relocated to St. Louis, Missouri north west of St. Clair County, Illinois. Russell is not found listed in the St. Louis, Missouri City Directory for the years 1887, 1889, and 1890. Russell is listed in the 1891 St. Louis City Directory living at 6444 Marmaduke Avenue.^{29,30,31,32}

Russell Hinckley Sr. died 22 November 1892 at 6444 Marmaduke Avenue in St. Louis, Missouri. He was buried at the Walnut Hill Cemetery in Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois: 2nd addition, Lot 13, Grave 4. The St. Louis Post Dispatch published the following obituary on 23 November 1892. "Russell Hinckley who died suddenly at the home of his son-in-law in St. Louis yesterday, was a few years ago one of Belleville's most prominent citizens. He was born near Smithton, eight miles south of here in 1821, and spent the best years of his life in St. Clair County. A few years ago he was known as one of the wealthiest men in the county. He conducted the Hinckley Bank here and had considerable real estate and other property. His failure, which is still fresh in the memory of Belleville people, was a great surprise. Hundreds of residents of this city lost money, some the savings of years, by the suspension of the bank. Since financial failure, Mr. Hinckley had resided in St. Louis. He was 70 years old. He had numerous relatives in Belleville."^{33,34,35}

Shortly before his death in 1892, Russell Hinckley prepared an account of a meteoric shower he experienced in 1833. The account was posthumously published in the St. Louis Post Dispatch on 4 December 1892.

The near approach of the comet so recently discovered by Prof. Holmes elicits much speculation upon this visitor from space, and many theories are being advanced pro and con as to the relative connection of comets and so-called star showers. When a boy of 11 years it was my extreme good fortune to witness the celebrated meteoric display of November 1833. Living on a farm at that time early rising, between 3 and 4 a.m. was required to insure a good days work. A brother 3 years my senior had started the fire and went to the front door when suddenly he called my name with the exclamation "Come here quick; the stars are falling." The rush of aerolites from the size

of lightning bugs to an orange with an occasional much larger one that would light up the heavens was incessant. "Look beyond," I said, "and you see the stars are all there, they are not falling." Our mother had charge of the household, father being at Belleville at the time where he was engaged on a job of carpentering. Immediately we all hurried to put on our clothes to attend to work and at the same time to view this wonder of wonders so new and unknown to us, which lasted until broad daylight. The night was still and wondrously clear. At one time, having to draw a bucket of water from the well, some thirty feet deep, just at the moment the bucket was at the bottom of the well a gigantic meteor, the largest that fell, shot athwart the zenith directly overhead, and the light it made was so vivid that I could see the bottom of the well the bucket full of water and the fibers of the rope with more distinctness than the sun could possibly give. It left a stream of light in its wake that was as white as snow, assuming a sinuous and serpentine trail that only faded from the sight as the sun began to show its disc in the East. The *Baltimore American* gave the best description of this monster, and Prof. Loomis of Yale College wrote out the best account of that event I have every met with. An anecdote or two as illustrating how people felt at this sudden and wonderful sight must close this hastily written paper. A farmer named Scott, who lived in Shiloh Valley, St. Clair County, Illinois, started early to St. Louis with marketing, and when near the French village bordering on the Grand Merias Lake, the fall was in full force and I have often heard him declare that he could see them plump into the water. This, however, was an optical illusion. As stated before, our father was in Belleville and he occupied a room where he could look out of a window that faced on a street and see the display. His window could be reached when suddenly there came a tapping and a call. "Uncle Tim get up and come out. The whole town is awake (it only had about two or three hundred inhabitants) and down at the bell-maker's on Illinois street they are holding a prayer meeting and Mrs. ----- is calling upon all to pray, for the final end, the day of judgment is at hand, the great and terrible day of the Lord, and when the sun rises in the morning it will turn into blood." Suddenly he shoved up to the window, and leaning out his head he said: "Does she say the sun will be turned to blood? Go back and tell her she's wrong in her scripture. It is the moon that is to be turned into blood." They made haste to do so, and it is needless to say that the pow-wow broke up without a doxology or a dismissal.³⁶

Jane Townsend Leverich and Russell Hinckley had nine children, four of whom survived to adulthood.

- i. John Penfold Hinckley was born 19 October 1846 in Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois. John died as a child from the measles on 22 June 1849 in Belleville.^{37,38}
- ii. Mary Eugenie Hinckley was born 20 April 1848 in Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois. Mary married Henry M. Davis on 17 March 1870 in St. Clair County. Mary died 27 December 1923 in Manhattan, New York Co, New York. Mary was buried at the Long Ridge Union Cemetery in Stamford, Fairfield Co, Connecticut.^{39,40,41,42,43}
- iii. Alletta Berrian Hinckley was born 14 December 1849 in Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois. Alletta died as a child 20 December 1855 in Belleville.^{44,45}
- iv. John Penfold Hinckley was born 25 January 1851 in Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois. John died as a child 2 January 1856 in Belleville.^{46,47}
- v. Webster Hinckley was born 15 June 1852 in Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois. Webster died as an infant 29 December 1852 in Belleville.⁴⁸
- vi. Russell Leverich Hinckley was born 9 November 1853 in Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois. Russell married for the first time Fannie Richardson Mattox 24 February 1876 in Belleville. They were divorced 8 November 1894 in St. Louis, Missouri. Russell married for the second time Margaret Lorena Gleason 17 December 1894 in Little Rock, Pulaski Co, Arkansas. They were separated circa 1910 and divorced circa 1911. Russell married for the third time Bertha Dinwiddie 18 April 1912 in Hot Springs, Garland Co, Arkansas. Russell died 3 June 1925 in Hot Springs. Russell was buried in the Walnut Hill Cemetery in Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois.^{49,50,51,52,53,54,55,56,57,58,59}
- vii. Jane Wiggins Hinckley was born 12 December 1855 in Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois. Jane married Edward T. Menkens 13 May 1884 in St. Clair Co. Jane died 20 February 1942 in St. Louis, Missouri. Jane was buried at the Walnut Hill Cemetery in Belleville.^{60,61,62,63,64,65,66}

- viii. Edward Chase Hinckley was born 6 May 1858 in Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois. Edward died as an infant 6 June 1858 at Belleville.⁶⁷

- ix. Walter Raleigh Hinckley was born 11 September 1859 in Belleville, St. Clair Co, Illinois. Walter married Amelia Celina Ogle 7 May 1881 in St. Clair Co. Walter died 20 August 1925 in Belleville. Walter was buried at the Walnut Hill Cemetery in Belleville.^{68,69,70,71}
